Collect and distribute treats safely

This helps minimize the risk of spreading COVID-19 while still allowing you and your family to enjoy spending time in the neighborhood.

Everyone is encouraged to wear a mask in public to prevent the spread of the disease. Fortunately, masks are a common component of a Halloween costume. Make one part of yours!

If you choose to distribute treats, consider leaving them outside rather than answering the door to give it out. Better yet, also leave a bottle of hand sanitizer with the bowl of treats so that children can sanitize their hands before taking a treat.

According to McKinney, the key thing to remember this year is that a few simple steps can help protect you and your family.
