In the past year alone, RRH auxiliary members donated more than 1,500 hours of service. They have taken on a variety of responsibilities over the years, including staffing and stocking the hospital's gift shop, raising funds for essential equipment, preparing baby baskets for new parents, stocking candy machines, and providing critical support at events like the hospital district's annual health fair.

"Volunteers go where they're needed," said Venetta Seals, Director of Public Relations and Volunteer Coordinator for RRH. "They greet visitors, comfort families, lend a hand to staff, and step up during busy community events. In every role, they serve with a full heart and a steady hand."

This year marks the third National Volunteer Week celebrated in the new 140,000-square-foot Reeves Regional Health campus. The expanded space has created even more opportunities for volunteers to engage with patients and staff.

"The new hospital has made a big impact on what our volunteers can do," Seals added. "Our volunteers love working in their Gift Shop, interacting with visitors, patients, and employees, and are always ready to help with special occasions and events. They are wonderful ambassadors for our modern facility sharing their warmth and personalities."

McKinney agrees that this new era for RRH wouldn't be complete without volunteer support.

"As we've grown as a facility, our volunteers have grown right alongside us," McKinney said. "They've embraced change, stepped into new roles, and remained a constant source of joy and connection for everyone who walks through our doors."

Many volunteers say the experience is just as rewarding for them. In addition to giving back, they enjoy the friendships and shared purpose that come with service.

"Volunteering creates real relationships," Seals said. "These aren't just shifts or tasks—this is a family. People stay involved because they know they're doing something meaningful together."

National Volunteer Week was first established in 1974 by presidential proclamation and continues to be a time to honor the spirit of service that strengthens communities. According to national data, nearly one in four Americans volunteers, contributing a collective 8 billion hours annually.

"Volunteering is good for the heart—literally and figuratively," said McKinney. "Studies show that helping others improves mood, reduces isolation, and even supports better health. Our volunteers feel good because they *do* good."

Membership in the RRH Auxiliary is open to adults 18 and older. Annual dues are \$5, and members are asked to contribute a minimum of 20 hours of service each year to remain in good standing. New volunteers receive orientation and training, and schedules are flexible to fit a variety of lifestyles.

"We welcome new members with open arms," Seals said. "If you have a heart for helping and a few hours to share, we'd love to have you join the team."
